Thank you for inviting me to talk to the Year 6s on this their graduation day.

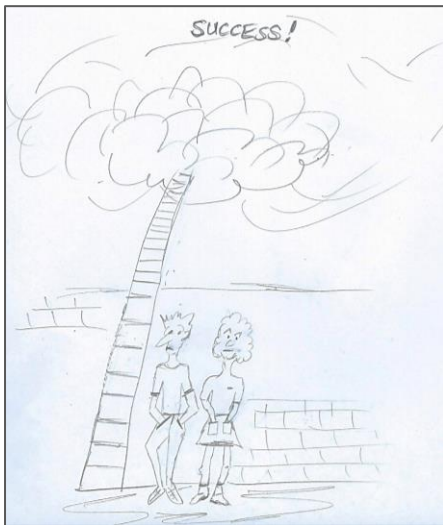
I'm looking around at all the proud Year 6 parents and carers who are here to see this important ceremony of transition from one life stage to another, from primary to secondary school.
