- Ensuring children grow up in a safe environment
- Taking action to ensure children are safe

It is our duty to...

- Always act in the best interest of the child
- Know how to identify children who may benefit from early help
- Know the different types of abuse, so you can identify children who may be in need of help or protection
- Know who the safeguarding team are
- Record accurately and report any concerns

Suspected cases of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) must be reported to the Police.

Whistleblowing
